The Class of 2022

Rolf Arnold established the Distance and Independent Study Center (DISC) at the Technical University of Kaiserslautern.

Mejai Bola Mike Avoseh is professor of adult and higher education at the University of South Dakota, USA., and a world leader in adult education.

András Benedek of Hungary is internationally recognized for his contributions to Hungary's vocational and adult education system.

Laura L. Bierema is a pioneering scholar whose work brings together critical approaches to adult learning, leadership, and change at the individual, group, and system levels.

Darlene E. Clover professor at the University of Victoria in British Columbia, Canada, co-leads the Research Group of the International Association of Women's Museums.

Raúl Valdés Cotera has inspired the development of inter- and cross-sectoral adult education and lifelong learning policies and strategies in many countries.

Per Paludan Hansen has played an important role in adult learning and education in Denmark and Europe. He is an officer of the International Council of Adult Education.

Larissa Jõgi of the School of Educational Sciences at Tallinn University, Estonia, has made extensive contributions to adult learning in Europe.

Wing On Lee has served as Vice President of the Open University of Hong Kong and Executive Director of the Institute for Adult Learning in Singapore.

Licínio C. Lima has been committed over four decades to the practice and advancement of adult learning and education.

Robert C. Mizzi has made contributions to adult education research and practice that have changed the landscape of the field.

Linda Morris, as president of AAACE and the Coalition of Lifelong Learning Organizations), has made social change and collaborative inquiry central to adult education.

Daphne W. Ntiri, Distinguished Service Professor at Wayne State University in Detroit, Michigan, has conducted projects in numerous African nations.

Niamh O'Reilly is Chief Executive Officer for AONTAS, Ireland's National Adult Learning Organization.

Michael Osborne is Director of the Centre for Research and Development in Adult and Lifelong Learning at the University of Glasgow.

Séamus Ó Tuama founded the Higher Education Ireland Lifelong Learning Network, which advocates for the interests of adult learners at universities and technical institutes across Ireland.

Sabine Schmidt-Lauff is professor of Continuing Education and Lifelong Learning at Helmut-Schmidt University/University of the Federal Armed Forces (HSU) in Hamburg, Germany.

Nancy Taber was named one of the Top 20 Women in Defence (2022) for the impact of her feminist work for Canadian Armed Forces cultural change.

Remembrance

Professor Lalage Bown OBE (HOF 2009) By Budd Hall (HOF 2005)

Lalage Bown died in December of 2021 just days before her 95th birthday after a fall in her home in Shrewsbury, UK. But her very international family needed time to bring her vast network together. Her celebration of life was held on August 9, 2022, in Shrewsbury, Shropshire, England.


Lalage, one of the most extraordinary adult educators of the 20th Century was born in Burma to a family in the British Indian Army. She was unique in the influence she had in building the field of adult education in pre-Independence Africa and then in the UK itself. As a young person her family moved to Shropshire where they had a large farm. A clever young woman, she attended Oxford University and, in 1949 at age 22, went out to Ghana as a regional adult education tutor for the newly created Oxford Extra-Mural Delegacy. She helped establish Extra-Mural Studies at the University of Ghana. She went on to provide adult education leadership at three universities in Nigeria, (Ibadan, Lagos and Amadu Bello), Makerere University in Uganda and the University of Zambia.

In 1980 after many years in Africa, she returned to the UK where she took up the post of Professor of Adult Education at Glasgow University. Active with writing, with speeches, with local intellectual activities, with charity work until her 94th year, her celebration of life brought relatives from many parts of the world, her two adopted Nigerian daughters, other Nigerian friends, major figures in African studies and friends from the Shrewsbury area. She was a feminist before that word was well known. She was a towering intellectual whose contributions to the foundations of adult education in Africa and beyond will never be forgotten. She loved a good party. She was generous and fun.

Remembrance



Huey Long (HOF 1996)
Died August 12, 2022

I first met Dr. Huey Long in 1979 shortly after beginning my doctoral program at Syracuse University. He was an external reviewer for the Adult Education Program, and I spoke with him briefly. Over the years, our paths crossed many times in many ways.

Probably my closest association with Huey was through our shared interest in self-directed learning (SDL). Huey was a major influence on SDL both through his scholarship and his leadership. He first wrote about SDL in a 1976 monograph on adult education in Colonial America. He convened the first International Self-Directed Learning Symposium in 1986. Over the next decades he provided the vision for what eventually became the International Society for Self-Directed Learning, which, along with its journal, the *International Journal of Self-Directed Learning*, has continued to be a major source of research and practice in SDL. His legacy continues as the 36th annual symposium will be held in February, 2023.

Throughout his career, Huey made contributions to many areas of adult and continuing education including history, gerontology, leadership, and adult learning theory. He was a leader in the field, serving as President of the Adult Education Association of the USA in 1977-1978. A highly productive scholar, Huey wrote many books and his work appeared in a wide range of journals. He was a long-time faculty member at the University of Georgia and the University of Oklahoma, where he was director of a multimillion-dollar Kellogg-funded center for continuing professional and higher education. Among his international experiences was a 1984 visit to Tanzania to evaluate adult learning programs in rural communities.

Huey was one of the original inductees to the Hall of Fame in 1996. He was an inspirational figure in adult and continuing education, and he will be missed by all whom he touched, either personally or through his writings and leadership in the field.
